DESPISING OTHERS!

British novelist **Charles Dickens** once said, "Throughout our life, our worst weaknesses and meanness are usually committed for the sake of the people whom we most despise." There are times that those who despise people will never get best out of others and themselves.

The Pharisees detest tax collectors and would never see anything good in them. Tax collectors are seen as traitors by their own people. Jesus uses these two groups (a Pharisee and a tax collector) in His parable to illustrate the importance of praying with humility. In fact, His parable is addressed to "people who are convinced of their own righteousness and despise others." Both tax collector and Pharisee went into the temple to pray.

While at prayer, the Pharisee was so proud, showing off in the temple and telling God how wonderful he is, how much he does, and how important he believes himself to be. He condemned the tax collector who came to pray with him in the temple. He clearly forgets to pray with humility and leaving judgment to God. The Pharisee got off the right track, he was full of pride at his own self-righteousness rather than being grateful for the righteousness of God. On the other hand, the tax collector offers no excuses for his sins and never entertains the thought that at least he's better than some others. He also realized he didn't have much to be proud so he offers his true contrition and begged for God's mercy.

At the end of the story Jesus praises the Tax collector's humility and contrition but condemns the Pharisees pride. The lesson of the parable is, even though we might be better off we shouldn't despise others. None of us is really worthy to stand before God's presence. You might notice that's why the way Mass begins. By acknowledging we are not perfect when we approach God, and therefore as we start Mass we approach him asking for his mercy and forgiveness.
